ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION

Sections under the Administrative Services Division include the Physical Plant, Audio-Visual and Electricity, Human Resource Management, Records, Health and General Services, and the Motor Pool.

The Division's key activities during the report period are outlined as follows:

- A. Completion of the three-storey, 10-classroom College of Law and Graduate School Building** at Manalo Campus on November 3, 1999 with a total cost of Ten Million Pesos (P10,254,000.00). The Honorable Cong. Alfredo E. Abueg, Jr. of the 2nd District of Palawan provided initial funding of P2,700,000.00. while P7,554,500.00 came from the University budget for 1997 and 1999.

Almost 95% of the Shop Building at Tiniguiban Heights Campus was completed as of March 30, 2000. Items still for completion are the electrical, tile and other minor works. When completed, the Building will have a total floor area of 562.50 sq.m.

Specifications required for maintenance works for particular buildings with a *total floor area* maintained at *fourteen thousand eight hundred fifty (14,850) square meters* were attended to/accounted for:

1. **College of Business and Accountancy** – *repair* of roofing, gutters, and hallway; *replacement* of broken jalousie blades in class and comfort rooms, storm drainage, grill doors and windows. Estimated floor area was maintained at 2,400 sq.m.
2. **College of Education** – *repair* on the comfort rooms included urinals, water closets, leaking pipes and faucets, doors, windows, drainage system and of the dean's office and faculty room; *replacement* of jalousie blades, electrical fixtures, switches; and *repainting* of hallway/lobby area. Estimated floor area was maintained at 3,000 sq.m.

3. **College of Arts and Humanities** – *repair* of comfort rooms covered water closets, urinals, doors and windows, electrical wirings, fixtures and switches; *replacement* of blackboards and bulletin boards; *repainting* of the whole building; *repair* of the PIONEER, Audio-visual hall, and dean's offices and faculty room. Estimated floor area maintained was at 1,600 sq. m.
4. **College of Sciences** – *repair/replacement* of comfort rooms, water closets, electrical lights, switches; *repainting* of walls, doors and windows. Estimated floor area was maintained at 1,000 sq.m.
5. **College of Engineering, Architecture and Technology** – *repair* of comfort rooms, doors and windows, roofing; *replacement* of jalousie blades and holders, leaking pipes and faucets, electrical fixtures, etc. and *repainting*. Estimated floor area was maintained at 900 sq.m.
6. **Performing Arts Center** – *repair/replacement* of windows, comfort rooms, water closets and urinals, and *repainting*. Estimated floor area was maintained at 500 sq.m.
7. **Multipurpose Hall** – *repair* of doors, flooring, electrical lights and wirings. Estimated floor area maintained at 750 sq.m.
8. **Home Management** – *repair* of comfort rooms and water closets and *replacement* of termite-infested walls. Estimated floor area was maintained at 300 sq.m.
9. **Home Economics** – *repair* of ceiling, gutters, walls, floors, doors and windows with estimated floor area maintained at 100 sq.m.
10. **Canteen** – *repair* and *repainting* of roofing sheets, windows, and doors with an estimated floor area maintained at 400 sq.m.
11. **Medical Clinic** – *repair and repainting* of roofing sheets, windows, doors; estimated floor area maintained at 700 sq.m.

12. **Manalo Campus** - 200 sq.m. floor area was maintained

13. **Administration** - 3,000 sq.m. floor area was maintained

The section also attended to the construction of temporary bathhouses at the Tiniguiban Campus for the Puerto Princesa City delegation to the *Southern Tagalog Regional Athletic Association (STRAA) Millennium Palaro* on February 27 to March 5 and for the fourteen Region IV SUC delegations to the *State Colleges and Universities Athletic Association (SCUAA) Meet* which was held on March 11-17, 2000.

Another accomplishment include the repair of 250 broken chairs, 20 tables, 15 cabinets, 10 blackboards and fabricated 5 new units .

Throughout the feat of these tasks, technical and manual skills were provided by the University Engineer, the Construction and Maintenance Foreman and a limited number of emergency laborers.

B. Maintenance of a systematic recording and processing of official communications. In addition to two regular personnel in the unit, support services in the Records section were complemented by student aides.

C. Maximum utilization of service vehicles. Of the seven vehicles in the university, there are only three units which are in running condition: KIA Besta, Toyota Hi-Lux, RS Motorcycle, and for the past tw three months, the Kia Ceres was restored in working order. The three others - IH bus, Volks Kombi, and Mitsubishi Lancer all needed thorough overhaul and reconditioning.

D. Maintenance of campus environmental sanitation and beautification. Janitorial services were intensified in waste collection and disposal, ecosystem management, interior decoration, grounds and buildings maintenance, and messengerial task. Whenever work schedules allowed, utility workers served as office aides and messengers.

E. Intensified health campaign. Annual physical check-up and the necessary laboratory examinations were required of all employees. Medical and dental services were extended to family members of

employees free of charge; occasionally, with free medicines. Incoming freshmen and new students were required to undergo medical and dental check-up before they were issued clearance for enrolment to ensure the students' physical fitness for academic work complementing the students' aptitude for course work.

Medical and dental records of faculty and staff and students were updated.

The medical services has reportedly supported the extensive prescription of generic drugs in response to the government's campaign by 100%.

The University dentist and his staff visited and conducted dental services at the Extramural Studies Centers in Brooke's Point, Quezon, Roxas and Taytay.

In the area of **personnel development**, the Medical Services staff attended three seminars during the report period: the school nurse attended a seminar on cardiovascular diseases while the Medical Officer attended the seminar on aids and the financial management seminar on GO/NGO projects, all on official time.

Instruments/Equipments procured during the year include one unit each of nebulizer, oxygen apparatus, Baumanometer: desk model, stethoscope and two units weighing scale.

The **Reproductive Health Care Center** based at Manalo Campus shared in the University's **extension services**. Among its major services are free consultation and medical examination, family planning counseling, pre and post natal examination, distribution of condoms and pills for free, pelvic examination, PAP smear examination, IUD check-up, insertion and removal, pregnancy test, immunization/tetanus toxoid, and *Depo-Provera* (*depot-medroxyprogesterone acetate*, DMPA), the injectable contraceptive. Midwifery students attend to women clients in the Center for actual clinic practice required in the midwifery course.

F. The Performing Arts Center, Multi-Purpose and Audio-Visual Halls were venues of conferences, seminars, and symposia for both the University and outside agencies. University activities such as programs, religious services, beauty contests, and sports competitions such like basketball, volleyball, badminton, or *taekwondo* were held at the Multi-Purpose Hall.

The PAC and multi-purpose halls were also venues for Physical Education classes.

Some sports events in the *Southern Tagalog Regional Athletic Association (STRAA) Millennium Palaro* and the *State Colleges and Universities Athletic Association (SCUAA) Meet 2000* were held at the multi-purpose hall.

G. The **Human Resource Management** section achieved the following targets for the report period:

Twenty-three (23) new personnel were hired for the unfilled positions. Ninety-four (94) appointments were prepared, processed and submitted to the Civil Service Commission classified as: renewal (42), original (12), contractual (15), reappointment (10), re-employment (6), change of status (5), transfer from other agencies (3), change of item (2), reclassification (1), promotion(1), transfer of position (1), and casual (9).

Fifty-seven (57) personnel were granted step increments.

Three hundred sixty-one (361) Phil Health Cards were distributed to employees. The Section consolidated the results and prepared the final listing of 176 faculty evaluation as embodied in the National Budget Circular 461. However, its implementation is temporarily suspended.

Notices of Salary Adjustment for 403 personnel were prepared and distributed.

The office spearheaded the granting of the *PSU Loyalty Award* to twenty-one (21) Civil Service Commission, and sixty-one (61) on the occasion of the University's *28th Foundation Anniversary* at the Asiaworld Resort Hotel on March 2, 2000.

The 1998 performance evaluation of 267 personnel were checked and made available for productivity pay computations.

Assets, liabilities and networth summary report for 371 personnel were submitted to the Office of the Ombudsman, Manila.

Other reports/documents prepared by the Section include the list of personnel who were entitled to other incentives, retirement papers

of 5 personnel, monthly Report on Personnel Actions due to the University's CSC accreditation, monthly report on tardiness and absenteeism, loan requirements, service records, certifications, identification cards, and service credits.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

For the year 1999 Palawan State University received a total allotment from the National Government amounting to PESOS: Eighty-eight Million Two Hundred Ninety-three Thousand Five Hundred & 00/100 (P88,293,500.00) which is composed of the following:

1. Personal Services	P 70,950,500.00
2. Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses	12,096,000.00
3. Capital Outlays	<u>5,247,000.00</u>
Total Allotment Received	<u>P 88,293,500.00</u>

The amount for capital outlays is for the completion of Petroleum Engineering and the College of Law Buildings.

Of the total allotment of P 88,293,500.00, only P82,584,704.00 was utilized, leaving a balance of P5,708,796.00 as of December 31,1999. This amount is composed P 3,148,425.00 for Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE), and P 2,560,371.00 for Capital Outlays.

This balance of P 5,708,796.00 is treated as a continuing appropriations for the year 2000, which means that it can be utilized until year 2000 as allowed for by the existing rules and regulations.

The University has realized a revenue amounting to PESOS: Six Million Nine Hundred-five Thousand & 00/100 (P 6,995,000.00) in 1999. Of this amount, approximately 77% comes from the tuition and miscellaneous fees paid by the students. This income was utilized as supplement to the allotment from the national government; more particularly, the current operating expenditures.

Inspite of meager financial resources, the University was able to accomplish its task in 1999.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIVISION OF ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

School Year 1999-2000

Introduction

The reformulated vision and mission of the university under the new leadership has called for new thinking and change to make education responsive to the demands of the rapidly changing society and to the challenge of global competitiveness.

With the new vision and mission of the university in place, Vice-President for Academic Affairs, the Deans, and the faculty members were and are actually working jointly towards the accomplishment of the vision and mission.

School Year 1999-2000 is another year of notable accomplishment of the Academic Affairs Office in terms of instruction.

Academic Highlights

The major accomplishments are:

1. Strategic Development Plans by Colleges for Years 2000-2003

The National Economic Development Authority (NEDA)-Region IV assisted Seminar-Workshop on Visioning, Strategic Development Planning and Budget Preparation held at Puerto Aventura Beach Resort, Puerto Princesa City, on October 19-22, 1999 has provided PSU administrators through understanding of the PSU strategic directions. The deans, department chairpersons and the faculty members worked hand-in-hand to accomplish the colleges' development plans.

2. Accreditation of Academic Program

The awarding of Level 2 Accredited Status to the Teacher Education (BSEd and BEEd) and Business Education (BS Accountancy and Bachelor in Business Administration) and the Level 1 Accredited Status to the Graduate Education (MA in Education) programs by the Accrediting Agency for Chartered Colleges and Universities of the Philippines (AACCUP), Inc. on May 13, 1999 has posed a big challenge to the concerned colleges.

During the academic year 1999-2000, the College of Education, College of Business and Accountancy and the Graduate School contributed inner resources such as talents, drives, time, and energy to work on the requirements set by AACCUP to qualify for the Level 3 (Teacher Education and Business Education Program) and Level 2 (Graduate Education Program) Accredited Status, given the duration May

13, 1999-May 12, 2002 (Teacher Education and Business Education) and April 13, 1999-April 14, 2001 (Graduate Education).

Likewise, the Engineering Program (BS Mechanical Engineering and BS Civil Engineering) which was given a Deferred Status during the AACUP Formal and Preliminary Survey Visit has been working on with the requirements set by the accrediting team in preparation for the Level 1 Accredited Status within school year 2000-2001.

4. Information Technology

The university has its own website, <http://www.psu.itgo.com>, where all information about the institution can be accessed worldwide. It also has its own e-mail address, psu@pal-onl.com.

The computerization of the Registrar's Office is expected to be accomplished before opening of classes in June, 2000. This is part of the PSU Networking Project which was started in 1998. Through this, access to university information and other information are made possible.

The PSU Development Information Center was established to link the institution to state and government information sources, private business organizations, professionals involved in development in the province of Palawan. Faculty members with expertise in Economics, Sociology, Agriculture, Engineering, Biology, Business and Public Administration, Computer Science, Systems Analyses and Designs, and Statistics, have been tapped to compose the Task Force of the Development Information Center.

5. PSU College of Education as Center of Excellence in Teacher Education in Region IV

The Commission on Higher Education (CHED) Technical Panel for Teacher Education conducted an assessment at the College of Education on August 13-16, 2000. The team was composed of Dr. Rocita Navarro, Team Leader, Dr. Ma. Rosita Ortiz and Dr. Mely Sevilla as members representing CHED.

The College of Education, in coordination with the Research, Planning and Development Office has taken the initiative to propose an inter-agency (between and among the Provincial Government of Palawan, the various municipal governments, the Department of Education, Culture and Sports, the State Polytechnic College of Palawan, and other private institutions) effort to look into the Palawan School Division's performance in the 1994-1998 National Elementary Achievement Test (NEAT) and National Secondary Achievement Test (NSAT). The "SAGIP EDUKASYON" project which was started in October, 1999 has been proposed based on the DECS report during the 1999 Provincial Planning Convention that the Division of Palawan ranked seventeenth (17th) out of seventeen (17) school divisions in Region IV from 1994-1998. A training program for teachers in English, Mathematics, and Science was presented in December, 1999.

CED has kept with its networking activities with other institutions with education program in the region. Two (2) faculty members were involved as case writers in a CHED-sponsored collaborative research on laboratory schools in Region IV conducted by the Philippine Normal University Research Center.

For school year 1999-2000, the AB/BS-BSE Curriculum under the Curriculum Initiative for Teacher Education (CITE) Program of the CHED was piloted in the College of Education, being the Center of Excellence for Teacher Education in Region IV. This new curriculum is a double-degree program which enables the graduate to obtain two degrees: AB or BS and BSED with major fields in English, Mathematics and Science.

Forty (40) College freshmen enrolled in this program were granted scholarships by the CHED. The incentives given to the scholars included free tuition and other school fees, book allowances and a monthly stipend of P 1,500.000

There are 36 student scholars of the CHED-Center of Excellence Scholarship Program. Twelve (12) of these scholars from the first batch graduated in April, 2000. Twenty four (24) are in the third year and belong to the second batch of scholars.

Five (5) faculty members have been recipients of the CHED Scholarship Program since 1997. One, who is taking a doctorate degree in Reading at UP Diliman, and two who are at the master's level (Environmental Science and Mathematics) are expected to complete the degree before the start of SY 2000-2001. The other two who are specializing in Physics and Chemistry in the same university will finish the program during the first semester of SY 2000-2001.

6. PSU as a Learning Center of the UP-Open University

The open university started offering certificates in Science teaching with major areas in Biology, Chemistry and Physics at PSU in 1989. In 1992, Science Teaching Using Distance Instruction (STUDI) took over with learning centers at Palawan National School – main (15 students), Roxas Comprehensive National High School at Roxas, Palawan (14 students). Of the 29 students, twelve (12) graduated. In 1995, the UP-DOST Open University was established and the programs offered were Diploma in Science and Technology (DST) and Diploma in Mathematics Teaching (DMT) with 20 enrollees. Of these 5 earned the DST and 4 in DMT. Of the group, 4 graduated.

There are 11 enrollees (Batch 1998) who are expected to graduate in August, 2000.

There were 3 faculty members from the College of Sciences who graduated from the UP-DOST Open University, 1 for DMT (Prof. Leticia Sanchez), and 2 for DST (Ms. Ma. Teresa Delera and Ms. Jennelyn Cabrestante). Two faculty members qualified for scholarship in the Ph.D. program. One (Prof. Lorna C. Gelito, Biology) took the comprehensive examination in February, 1999, while the other (Prof. Carmencita G. Palanca, Physics) is scheduled to take the comprehensive examination in August, 2000.

As the only learning center of the UP-Open University based in Los Baños, PSU has continuously served as a center where opportunities for alternative access to quality higher education through distance education is provided to teachers and other professionals in Puerto Princesa City and the province of Palawan.

7. PSU as Regional Center for Filipino Language

The PSWF-IV continued to carry on its key role in the development, propagation and promotion of the national language through relevant activities and projects during the period under review. The faculty, staff and students of the university took the stellar role in this venture, led and showed the way. Foremost in its list is the sponsorship of activities during the observance of the *Buwan ng Wikang Pambanse '99* with the theme, "*Filipino sa Kanayunan: Tugon sa Pagkakaisa ng Sambayanan.*"

The nationwide celebration of the National Language Month literally started in Puerto Princesa City with the presence of the Chairman of the Commission on National Language, Dr. Nita P. Buenaobra who graced the Opening Ceremonies at the Mendoza Park with the highest officials of the City of Puerto Princesa and the Province of Palawan in attendance. Numbers of the program were contributions from the public and the private schools in all levels. The audience was a motley group coming from different walks of life.

Other featured activities during the month were:

1. *Porum sa Pananaliksik* with professors from State Polytechnic College of Palawan and Palawan State University as paper presentors.
2. *Misa ng Pasasalamat sa Araw ng Pagkakatatag ng Panrehiyong Sentro ng Wikang Filipino-IV* on August 14, 1999 at the Immaculate Conception Cathedral, Puerto Princesa City.
3. Language For a for Undergraduate students dubbed as *Talakayang Pangwika Para sa mga Mag-aaral*.
4. Competition to select *Mutya ng Wika* in the elementary and in college. The contest yielded a small sum for the Sentro. As of April 2000, P36,777.79 is the cash available, now deposited at the PSU Credit Cooperative.
5. Weekly Literary Contest – *Paligsahan sa Pagbigkas ng Tula, Pag-awit, Sayaw, Sabayang Pagbigkas. Dagliang Pagbigkas, Balagtasan*.
6. Information Dissemination about Filipino through the PSU on the Air Program and other radio stations in the city.
7. Use of Filipino in Official Correspondence.
8. Class Discussion on the Vision, Mission, Projects of the Commission on National Language, Panrehiyong Sentro ng Wikang Filipino, and timely topics As the New Filipino Alphabet. Intellectualization, Modernization of Filipino And the like.
9. Closing and Awards Program on August 31, 1999

Special feature of the Opening Program was the Awarding of Plaque of Recognition to Mayor Edward S. Hagedorn and Gov. Salvador P. Socrates. Both are contributing immeasurably in the development of Filipino through frequent use of Filipino in official and non-official discourse.

Researches on the indigenous languages of Palawan continue to be undertaken by the faculty. In addition, a joint project of the faculty and students are studies in Filipino and inidegnous languages through the latter's theses. To date, there are finished researches awaiting publication.

8. Curriculum Review and Updates

Globalization of education calls for new thinking and change in the university curricular programs. College curriculum committees and academic administrators came up with proposals for change for the enhancement of curricular offerings responsive to the needs of the environment.

The curricula for the Bachelor of Accountancy, Bachelor of Hotel and Restaurant Management, and the Bachelor of Science in Architecture were revised. Implementation of the revised curricular will be effective school year 2000-2001.

At the Graduate School, policies on the setting of a maximum residence rule (MRR) which will apply to all current and new students, composition of thesis committee for the master's level, ratings for Dissertation Writing (Ed. 724) and Thesis Writing (Ed/PA/Mgmt 624), and ratings in the comprehensive examination were approved for implementation effective SY 2000-2001. Also approved for implementation in June, 2000 are the admission and retention policies for the Bachelor in Accountancy and the Bachelor of Science in Hotel and Restaurant Management.

9. Research

The formulated university research agenda for 1998-2005 requires the need to hone the research skills of the members of the academe.

The different colleges, in coordination with the Research, Planning and Development Office sponsored/attended research seminars/conferences/for a through linkages with other units/agencies (Philippine Council for Agricultural Resources and Development, National Government Organizations, Philippine Council for Aquatic and Marine Resources Development, Palawan Research and Development Consortium, Department of Science and Technology).

The Graduate School and the College of Engineering, Architecture and Technology sponsored one research forum each participated in by faculty and students. The university was able to avail of the services of Prof. F. Landa Jocano, a competent and dedicated research consultant of UP Diliman in October, 1999. The policy of adopting the deloading of faculty members involved in research was started in June, 1999. Gradual improvement of quality of student researches (relevant and responsive) was also implemented at the start of SY 1999-2000.

10. Faculty and Staff Development

To achieve a positive professional image of faculty and staff members, a Faculty and Staff Development Plan was formulated in October, 1999.

Degree and non-degree scholarships to deserving faculty and staff members in prestigious institutions of learning were provided. Other privileges enjoyed by faculty and staff are: sabbatical leave, attendance to seminar-workshops and conferences either on official business and official time, thesis/dissertation assistance, and special leave with pay.

The university also conducted conferences and training programs for faculty and staff development.

11. Student Publications

The official student publication, The PIONEER came out regularly. The College of Education published its own school organ, The Glimpse, which came out regularly. The Cuyo Extramural Studies Center has maintained the regular publication of its paper, The PIONEER. Likewise, the College of Business and Accountancy has also put up its quarterly newsletter, the Business Forum.

On the graduate front, the Graduate School published the PSU Research Journal managed by the students and directly supervised by the Dean. The College of Law has also published the Palawan Law Journal.

The laboratory schools: Elementary and High School came out with their own school papers.

12. Students' Development

The different colleges spearheaded and supported in a series of activities in line with their student development program. Seminar-workshops, for a, field trips (lakbay-aral) locally and other parts of Luzon, Visayas, Mindanao were held to supplement instruction. Student organizations were given due recognition as part of leadership training and decision-making. Co-curricular activities were made available. Regular celebration as earth month (Pista ng Kagueban (June), Nutrition Month (July), Filipino Month (August), Science Month (September), Scouting Month (October), Book Month (November) World Aids Day, Education Week and Teachers' Day (December), Construction Day (January) Junior-Senior Promenade activities (February), Foundation Day Anniversary and Fire Prevention Month (March) and other activities were observe. Students were also involved in the Cultural Academic and Sports activities sponsored by local government units, private organizations and non-government organizations. The University also provided scholarship incentives to talented students inclined to dancing, singing, and sports. Politically – inspired students joined different affiliations and ran for the different offices (all levels).

Student organizations had served as partners of the university in realizing its programs and projects through fund-raising activities. These organizations donated instructional materials, constructed covered walk in strategic places, and provided funding assistance for finance various projects of the different colleges. The Adopt-a-Facility Project initiated by the College of Law and the Graduate School elicited positive response from civic-spirited citizens. Room/Offices furnished with facilities bear the donors' names in recognition of the supported extended.

13. Sports Development and Physical Fitness

The Physical Education Department, in coordination with the different colleges came up with a year-round program for sports development. Students who excelled in the different sports events were extended, scholarship in athletics. Students were prepared for sports competitions such as, the Intra-Collegeiate Meet, the City Meet, Provincial Meet, STRAA Meet for the elementary and secondary students and SCUAA for the students in the tertiary level.

The university played host to the city delegation during th STRAA Meet 2000 on February 29-March 5, 2000. There were elementary and secondary students who were selected as players during the STRAA Meet. The University also hosted the State Colleges and Universities Athletic Association (SCUAA) – IV Meet on March 11-16, 2000. Palawan State University won the overall championship.

14. Laboratory Schools Performance

The laboratory schools obtained a very satisfactory performance in the NEAT and NSAT. Students fared well in local, regional and national academic competitions they joined in

The Parent-teacher's Associations had been supportive of all undertakings of the laboratory schools. Both PTAs provided financial assistance for the purchase of instructional materials, such as books, computers and other audio-visual aids, fixtures and furniture. They had also supported attendance of faculty and students in seminars and conferences.

15. The College of Community Resources Development

The seven (7) extramural studies center under the College Community Resources Development has continuously made their presence felt in the community through the courses they offer. The local governments, as effective partners of the university in providing tertiary education in seven (7) municipalities extended financial assistance to the schools during the SY 1999-2000. There are:

The Palawan College of Arts and Trades in Cuyo was integrated with the Palawan State University on October, 1999 by virtue of RA 8745.

The conversion of ESC Brooke’s Point and ESC Quezon as branches was already presented to the lower house authored by Hon. Alfredo E. Abueg, Jr., Congressman, Second District, Palawan. Approval of the bill into a law which would mean a separate budget for the two centers is expected this coming school year 2000-2001.

16. Curricular Offerings

The university continued/maintained the offering of thirty-one degree courses and eight non-degree courses in college during the period. With the implementation of the strategic development for 2000 – 2003, the university will start phasing down non-degree courses in all campuses as well as degree courses which are not relevant to the present need and demand of the community it serves.

17. Milestones – Faculty Who Made Waves

- Dr. Erlinda D. San Juan, Pangrehyong Sentro ng Wikang Filipino – IV Director was among the seven individuals honored by the Komisyon sa Wikang Filipino for her contributions and efforts in the propagation and development of Filipino. This was given during the Araw ng Gawad held at the Club Filipino, Greenhills San Juan, Metro Manila on August 29, 1999. Dr. San Juan also passed the screening for the ongoing Search for Ten Outstanding Teachers sponsored by METROBANK which has started in February, 2000.
- AACCUP Accreditors from PSU: Dr. Elizabeth J. Magay, Dr. Ofelia F. Dusong, Dr. Nita J. Socrates, Prof. Carmen M. Fernandez and Engr. Eduardo A. Gadiano have continuously extended their active involvement in the accreditation process of state universities and colleges all over the country where the institutions are based.

RESEARCH AND EXTENSION DIVISION

The division of Research and Extension is headed by a vice president assisted by two directors; each responsible for the planning and conducting of research and conducting non-degree courses, special training programs or other extension activities utilizing the university expertise to accommodate the demands of the community and other stakeholders.

Research Fora

The Research, Planning and Development Office organized the Research Forum on January 7 and 21, 2000. The forum was conducted by Dr. Tita Dumada-ug from the State Polytechnic College of Palawan – *Aquatic Science and Technology Institute* at the PSU Conference Hall. It was participated in by all research coordinators and other faculty members who have on-going researches as follows:

The *PSU Barita* is a fortnightly newsletter of the university with issues focused on university activities and other community affairs wherein PSU was involved.

The *PSU BULLETIN*, an official publication to disseminate laws, memorandum circulars, policies and guidelines from the Commission on Higher Education, City and Provincial ordinances, Department of Budget and Management, Commission on Audit, State Universities and Colleges (SUC's).

EXTENSION

Extension services in the university aims to initiate, catalyze and sustain the development of various communities using the university's expertise, research outputs and available resources. It is a potent and vital instrument in realizing institutional goals and perspective. It supplements the function of instruction by implementing non-formal education activities. It complements the function of research through the dissemination of the product of research to the university stakeholders.

I. Extension Projects

The following projects were accomplished in coordination with the National, Provincial and City Governments, Western Command, Technical Education Skills Development Authority (TESDA), and other Non-Government Organization (NGOs) and Government Organizations (GOs).

A. *SAGIP EDUKASYON* is an extension program which started in August 1999 with the aim to respond to the needs of basic education to upgrade the decline in the quality of education. In an alarming report by the Department of Education, Culture and Sports (DECS), schools in the elementary and high schools in the province of Palawan ranked last at number 17 in the National Elementary and Secondary Achievement Tests (NEAT/NSAT) from 1995-1998. In a concerted effort to respond to the challenge of surpassing mediocrity in the implementation of basic education the local leaders, through the Palawan State University extension services proposed *SAGIP EDUKASYON*, a collaborative enhancement program with the Provincial

Government (PG), Department of Education Culture and Sports (DECS) City and Provincial divisions, State Polytechnic College of Palawan (SPCP), Puerto Princesa School of Arts and Trades (PPSAT), Fullbright College, and the Holy Trinity College. The Provincial Government, through Governor Salvador P. Socrates pledged his support to the program with an initial release of Three Hundred Twenty Thousand Pesos (P320,000.00) to fund a field research *to identify the Factors Affecting Low Performance in the NEAT/NSAT* in order to generate remedial measures to improve the teaching-learning performance in the elementary and high school levels. SAGIP EDUKASYON is an offshoot of a related study conducted by Prof. Marissa S. Pontillas, former Research Director and current Dean of the Graduate School entitled, *NEAT and NSAT performance of Schools in the Division of Palawan*.

B. *ENTREPRENEURSHIP DEVELOPMENT PROJECT* is another collaborative project between PSU and the Western Command's (WESCOM) Military Enhancement (MILE) Program. Its purpose is to equip military officers with entrepreneurial skills besides a military career. The first partnership project is a five-day entrepreneurial skills training course for retiring military officers conducted on July 17 - Aug. 14, 1999 by the College of Business and Accountancy (CBA) faculty through its extension coordinator, Prof. Jacinto Cabintoy.

C. *COOPERATIVE DEVELOPMENT TRAINING* Twenty three (23) participants completed the course in the two-day Pre-membership Training for Cooperative conducted on December 20-21, 1999 in another WesCom MILE Program conducted by the College of Business and Accountancy and the Graduate School through the extension coordinator, Dr. Romeo Valdez.

D. *PSU DEVELOPMENT AND INFORMATION CENTER TASK GROUP* was created to formulate the *PSU Student Survey Instrument* for data banking in response to the demands for such information for research purposes in the university and by other stakeholders. Three faculty members in charge of the project are: Prof. Jacinto Cabintoy, Prof. Carolina Baloran, and Mr. Isidro Manalon, all from the College of Business and Accountancy.

E. *BIDANI PROGRAM* - on November 15-21, 1999, four (4) core staff of the *PSU Extension division* from the Colleges of Business

Administration and Education were trained on *Barangay Integrated Development Approach for Nutrition Improvement of the Rural Poor* (BIDANI) at the University of the Philippines, Los Baños (UPLB); making PSU, one of the State Universities and Colleges (SUC) satellites of the UPLB.

F. *STUDENTS' EXTENSION VOLUNTEER WORK* - Thirty five (35) student officers and members of the *Economic Society*, from the College of Business and Accountancy (CBA) distributed gifts worth P75.00 each to 130 families in Quezon, Palawan on December 11, 1999 in a Christmas gift giving activity .

G. *HOUSEKEEPING AND CARE GIVING SEMINAR WORKSHOP* is a partnership venture between PSU and the Provincial Public Employment Service Office (PESO). A four-day Seminar-Workshop was designed and conducted to equip domestic helpers with skills in housekeeping duties like cooking, laundering, cleaning the house, table setting and handling household appliances like gas range, vacuum cleaner, washing machine, rice cooker and similar home appliances. The workshop included baby-sitting and care for the elderly. Seven (7) faculty members from the Home Economics department, one (1) from the Midwifery department, and another from the College of Engineering, Architecture and technology shared their expertise as resource speakers. Five (5) out of the twenty four (24) graduates in the workshop, all of whom are local residents of Puerto Princesa were employed right after the training. Other graduates resolved to seek employment abroad in coordination with the Provincial Employment Services Office (PESO).

II. Non-formal Education and Technology Transfer

A. *TRAINORS' TRAINING COURSE* - Forty six (46) military officers from the Western Command completed the forty (40) hours Trainors' Training Program aimed at enhancing training competencies of military officers in conducting seminar-workshops among civilian and military personnel on July 17, 24, 31 and August 7 and 14, 1999.

B. *PSU LITERACY ASSISTANCE TO THE OUT-OF-SCHOOL YOUTH (OSY) PROGRAM* - a development program with foundations in *Experiential Education and Service Learning* is a collaboration between PSU and the Palawan Conservation Corps (PCC), an *integrated residential program for out- of -school youth* (OSY)

aged 16-21. The PCC was initiated and sponsored by the City Mayor, Edward S. Hagedorn in coordination with other Gos, NGOs, business and educational institutions in the project implementation. The PCC is the *first conservation corps of its kind in Southeast Asia* in which PSU, through the College of Education was invited to conduct review classes for basic English, Math, Science and *Sibika at Kultura* (Civics and Culture). The review aims to empower the out-of-school youth to pass the Philippine Educational Placement Test (PEPT) to qualify them for enrolment to the next grade level should they decide to attend formal education classes. Student interns from the College of Education handled the review classes as a part of the interns' *Off-campus Teaching and Community Immersion* program requirements in the Bachelor in Secondary Education degree. Thirteen (13) out of 15 OSY took and **passed** the PEPT. The other two dropped out of the program to get married. The students were supervised by Prof. Magdalena Badajos and Ms. Ma. Aurora Loterte, faculty members of the CED.

The College of Engineering, Architecture and Technology through Arch. Eduardo Bober, faculty and students prepared a building design for the construction of a dormitory for the project beneficiaries. Other partnership activities have been proposed by the PCC and a Memorandum of Agreement was drafted and is being finalized for signature of PCC and the University, which is represented by the Extension Director and sits as member of the Board of Directors.

C. *ADOPT-A-BARANGAY* is a project of the Graduate School for barangay officials in *Barangay Sicsican* as target clientele. Initially, a preliminary meeting with Bgy. Sicsican council members was conducted by the faculty and graduate students headed by Dr. Romeo Valdez, GS Extension Coordinator on January 23, 2000.

D. *PSU - ON- THE -AIR*, a radio program which aims to reach out to the underprivileged Sector of the province of Palawan and Puerto Princesa City provide segments such as - *Oks ba ang Ingles N'yo, Wastong Gamit (Filipino)*, Trivia, university campus news, public service announcements and discussion of monthly themes like:

June - Independence Day, The Philippine Revolution,
Works, Life and Writings of Rizal

July - SGO election of officers, plans and programs of the SGO.

August - *Buwan ng Wika* with features on various activities of the Filipino Language Department

September - Science Month: Solid Waste Management

October - Centralization Act and other activities of the Student Government Organization

November - All Saints/Souls' Day traditions and beliefs

December - interview with the University President on her accomplishments and future plans in line with her vision/mission for PSU

E. *Hands-on training in Basic Meat Processing* was provided to forty six (46) housewives at Princess Urduja, Narra, Palawan in coordination with the Department of Agrarian Reform on August 5-8, 1999. A second batch of this training was also conducted on April 26-30, 1999 for wives of military personnel; fourteen (14) were trained and graduated.

F. *Basic and Advance Swimming* was provided to fifty five (55) children and wives of military personnel on April 15-30, 1999 at the Western Command, Puerto Princesa City.

G. *Basic Baking, Pansit Palabok and Pizza Pie Making* was conducted on July 1-4, 1998 in coordination with the City Social Welfare and Development for women representing nine barangays of Puerto Princesa City; twenty seven (27) women graduated from the course.
